### Games from other countries

### Game: Ching Chang Pok (Earth, Water, Fire)

(Similar to paper scissors rock but in teams)

Opening the hand palm downwards indicates Earth.

Fingers and thumbs drooping downwards indicates water.

Raising the fingers and the palms forward indicates fire.

Divide the Keas into two teams facing each other. Each team decides what they are going to do (quietly and everyone in the team must do the same). The teams then face each other, and the leader says 1,2,3 and they do the action.

Earth drinks water and wins. Water puts out fire and wins. Fire scorches water and wins. If both teams do the same no winner.

### Earth, Wind, Water Game

(Paper scissors, rock)

Earth - (Earthquake and volcano) - Hand in fist

Wind – (Flood and tsunami) Hand flat horizontally

Water – (Hurricane and tornado) Twist hand vertical with fingers spread apart

Rules:

Water beats Wind

Wind beats Earth

Earth beats Water

### Squirrel and Fox

Pick one fox and one squirrel. The rest of the Beavers pair off and become trees by facing each other, holding hands and putting their arms in the air. The fox chases the squirrel, who is holding a 'nut' in his hands, in and out of the trees. The squirrel is safe when he stands inside a tree. The squirrel passes the 'nut' to half of the tree, who becomes the squirrel, and the squirrel becomes half of the tree. The fox continues to chase the squirrel. If touched by the fox, the fox and the squirrel may change places or they may choose two new

### Chinese wall

Two parallel lines are drawn about a metre apart. One or two Keas stand between the lines and can't go beyond the lines. The others try to run from one line to the other line without being touched by Keas in the middle. If they are touched, they join the Kea in the middle. It continues until everyone has been caught. A leader calls out when Keas should try to cross from side to side.

### **Dragon Game**

Even if they can't see a dragon parade, your Keas will enjoy playing this game from Indonesia. Ask them to form a dragon by lining up in a file, each holding the waist of the Kea in front. The first person in line is the dragon's head and the last person is his tail. The object of the game is for the head to catch the tail. The tail, of course, does not want to be caught and tries to hold on tight so that the dragon does not break up while it twists and turns its way around the meeting hall. When the head catches the tail, the tail becomes a new head. Try to give as many Keas as possible a chance to be the dragon's head.

### **Fossils**

### What you'll need:

- 1 cup of used coffee grounds
- 1/2 cup of cold coffee
- 1 cup of flour
- 1/2 cup of salt
- Wax paper
- Mixing bowl
- Some small objects to make impressions in the dough (i.e. shells, plastic dinosaurs)
- Empty can or a butter knife
- Toothpicks (optional)
- String to hang your fossil, optional

### How to make it:

- Stir together the coffee grounds, cold coffee, flour, and salt until well mixed.
- Knead the dough together and then flatten it out onto the waxed paper.
- Use the can to cut out circles of the dough or use the dull knife to cut slabs large enough to fit your "fossil" objects.
- Press your objects firmly into the dough. When you take the object out, you have your "fossil". If you want to hang the fossil, poke holes into the edge to hold the string.
- Let the fossil dry overnight and then hang it if you wish.

#### Tips:

You may have to bake them for a short period to get the "dough" to harden - will not turn "rock hard". They are fun to make and the children enjoy them.

### Make an earth volcano

Outside activity!!

For each Posse/group you'll need:

- A tray with a lip, suitable for making a volcano and the lava not to run off the side
- Dirt/sand
- Jar
- Vinegar
- Red/yellow/orange food colouring
- Dishwashing liquid
- Baking soda

Have a tray for each posse group of four Keas. An alternative is to have a trailer full of dirt that they can all get around.

Put the jar in the middle of the tray. Put some dirt or sand on the tray. Add water for the Keas to build earth / sandcastle volcanos around the jar.

Get enthusiastic groups to put "folds" in their mountain for the lava to run down.

Quarter fill the jar with some vinegar, a few drops of red / yellow / orange food colouring and a squirt of dish wash liquid.

Add a heaped spoon of baking soda and watch the volcano erupt with bubbling hot looking lava.








### Scout sign, salute and handshake

### The Scout Handshake:

Scouts shake hands with their left hand; our founder Lord Robert Baden Powell started this. When he was in Africa many years ago he noticed that tribal chiefs put down their shield to shake hands, which is a sign that you trust the person you are meeting as they carry their spear in the right hand.



### The Scout Salute:

Stand at alert with your feet together and arms by your sides.

For Keas the easiest way to learn is to make a fist with your right hand. Hold that out in front of you. Extend your index finger (with the rest of the fingers still in the fist) and say "I Share", extend the middle finger and say "I care" extend the third finger and say "I discover", then touch the tips of the fingers to the side of the forehead and say "I grow". Then return the hand to your side.

The Scout salute is made as a greeting to other Scouts and at the opening ceremony at Cubs when the flag is broken, at Keas it can be practised after the Kea song.

### The Scout Sign:

This is only made at an investiture ceremony to honour and show respect for the promise that is being made, when the new Kea, Cub or Scout is making their promise. The person being invested makes the sign as well as all those invested in the room.

It is the same as the Scout salute but the hand is held at shoulder height while the promise is being made and then the hand is returned to the side.







#### Games:

#### **Cross the Lava Stream**

Mark two lines, 5-10 metres apart, they are the banks of the stream.

Issue each posse with three large pieces of cardboard. (approx. 1m square)

Starting at one bank, they have to cross to the other side without touching the ground.

Don't tell them how to do it. It won't take long for Keas to work out crowding on to two pieces of card and passing the rear piece forward.

#### **Lava Dance**

Leader to read out loud, pausing to allow Keas to do actions.

Keas LIE DOWN VERY STIFF AND STRAIGHT. Imagine you are hard rock being pushed and moved by earth's pressure plates. You get pushed deep underground ROLL OVER AND OVER.

Now imagine you are being pushed into the hot centre of the earth. Feel your bodies getting softer and softer. When the lava boils, make your bodies SWIRL AND TWIST just as boiling spaghetti would. It gets hotter and faster boiling.

Now, imagine you have been rocketed into the air by an eruption. What would happen? LEAPING BOUNCING JUMPING?

Now the lava is flowing and rolling down the mountainside. Make yourself feel loose and fluid like water pouring ROLL ALONG WALLS AND AROUND EACH OTHER.

As the lava moves away from the volcano it gets cooler and slower and finally it is cold enough that it SETS SOLID!

(Keas freeze in whatever position they are in.)

### Fire On the Mountain –for larger groups of at least 10 Keas

All Keas stand in a circle with a partner about two steps behind them – to make an inner and outer circle.

One odd Kea stands in the centre and shouts, "the mountain is on fire run, run, run". The Keas in the outer circle run around the outside until the Kea in the centre shouts "the fire is out", then the Keas run back to their partner, the odd Kea who was in the centre also tries to find a partner.

Keas are not allowed to run across the circle but must run around the outside. Keas in the inner circle change places with the outer circle and the game proceeds with another kea in the centre.

### The Story of Rotorua and the Te Arawa People

According to Maori mythology, Rotorua's Te Arawa people are the guardians of the thermal region of New Zealand. This right came from the early explorations of Ngatoroirangi, a famous Tohunga (spiritual leader) from the Arawa canoe. Rotorua's spouting hot geysers, mud pools and volcanic fire are said to be the result of Ngatoroirangi's actions.

Ngatoroirangi left Maketu on the coast, the site of the Te Arawa canoe landing spot, and travelled inland in a south-westerly direction. While resting on the eastern side of Lake Taupo one day, the clouds parted and Ngatoroirangi caught sight of the gleaming beauty of a mountain away to the south. Overwhelmed by the mountain's majesty, he ached to climb to the summit.

Venturing to the foot of the mountain, Ngatoroirangi ordered his travelling companions to stay put while he and his slave, Aruhoe, climbed the virgin peak. He left them with the words, "This is a hazardous venture and, if I am to return safely, you who remain must heed my words well. Eat no food as this will give me the strength I need and the gods will stay with me. When I return we will feast together and I will tell you of the things I learn from the mountain."

Indeed the journey was hazardous. The snowy air froze their breath and iced their fingers, numbed their toes and stiffened their joints. Aruhoe stumbled many times but Ngatoroirangi urged him onward.

Meanwhile, those waiting at the bottom of the mountain grew weary and hungry. One said, "He may have perished and we wait in vain" while another said, "Hunger is an impatient thing". So, with sidelong glances at the mountain, they lit their cooking fires and ate.

Their actions drove its icy cold fingers into Ngatoroirangi's heart. The stabbing cold caused him to bend over in agony, and he prayed to his sisters in Hawaiki (said to be the ancestral home of all Maori before they came to New Zealand) to send fire to warm him. "Oh Kuiwai, Oh Haungaroa came quickly. Ka riro au I te tonga?" (I am carried away by the cold south wind). Do not delay or I will surely perish," he cried. His sisters far off in Hawaiki heard Ngatoroirangi's prayer and called upon the fire demons to go to their brother's aid.

So Te Pupu and Te Hoata plunged into the sea and swam quickly across the Pacific Ocean until they came to Whakaari (New Zealand's only active marine volcanic now known as White Island off the Eastern Bay of Plenty coastline). As they lifted their heads into the air, the surrounding earth became a fiery pit where the heat remains until this day. As the fire demons rose they saw they still had many miles to go to reach Ngatoroirangi.

Down they went once more into the seas and under the earth's crust. Each time the fire demons surfaced – at Moutohora (Whale Island), Awakeri, Rotoehu, Rotoiti, Rotorua, Tarawera, Orakei Korako, Taupo and Turangi – they left a steaming, bubbling trail of thermal activity in their wake. The 'tunnel' they made connected White Island to Mt Ngaruahoe forever ore.

Like a flash of lightening the demons burst through the enormous cone of Tongariro arriving as Ngatoroirangi lay near death.

Although Aruhoe had already succumbed to death, the volcanic heat brought by the fire demons slowly revived Ngatoroirangi spreading warmth through his veins and sending life to his muscle and bone. He named the mountain Tongariro to commemorate the cold south wind that almost killed him.

And so it is that volcanic and thermal activity came to the region and Rotorua's Te Arawa tribe became its quardian.

#### Shake hands with a friend

This game is a quick way to introduce Keas to each other in a safe and unthreatening manner. The leader counts off the Keas by ones, twos, or threes. Everyone then walks around the room shaking hands with each other. A Kea, whose number is one, shakes the other Kea's hand once. If the number is two, the Kea shakes a hand twice. If the number is three, the Kea shakes three times.

One Kea will have to stop shaking while the other Kea continues because each Kea shakes a different number of times. Keas with identical numbers form a group looking for other Keas with the same number.

### **Candle holders**

#### What you'll need:

- Food coloring
- Water
- Paper doilies
- Kitchen tongs
- Paper towels
- Scissors
- Coloured tissue paper
- Straight-sided glass votive holders
- Paintbrush
- Craft glue

### Make it:

Doilies: In a large glass pie plate or pot, mix a dye bath using approximately 20 drops of food colouring (more for deeper colours) and two cups of water. Slide a doily (pre-bought or home-made) into the dye bath and push it down with the tongs so it's covered completely; let it sit for five seconds to two minutes, depending on the desired shade. Remove doily with tongs and place it flat on a stack of paper towels. Immediately blot it dry with another paper towel, then set it aside to dry on a clean paper towel.

Votives: Cut a rectangle of tissue paper that is 1" longer and 1" taller than the votive holder. Cut a piece of doily the same size or smaller. Use a paintbrush and coat the entire votive holder with a thin layer of watered-down glue. Adhere tissue to votive and use your fingers to smooth the bottom edge





underneath; turn upside down to dry. When dry, trim the excess tissue paper so that it's flush with the top edge. Apply glue mixture to the entire surface of the tissue-covered votive and adhere doily strip. Press down lightly with fingers and set it aside to dry. Trim the excess doily pieces from the votives, then brush a thin coat of glue on top to seal it; let dry completely.

### **Jolly Java Jackets**

Keas can fashion a striped or solid sock into a reusable sleeve for coffee or hot cocoa to go.

What you'll need: Old socks, fabric scissors, buttons, felt, felt stickers, fabric glue

**Make it:** Cut 4 inches from leg of sock to form a cup cozy. Add felt, buttons, stickers into a pattern or picture using fabric glue.

### Lesson Plan 2 - Brainstorm, what can you hear?

It is surprising all the noises that you can hear in the classroom even when everyone is quiet. Well, what are they? Get each student to write down everything they can hear when everyone is trying to be quiet. Can you hear the clock? Wind? Talking? Breathing? Cars? Airplanes? Footsteps? See what interesting noises everyone can hear. Are you aware of those sounds?

#### Discussion topic:

Talk about what it would be like to be a deaf person and get each student to mention what might be a safety hazard for people who are deaf/hearing impaired. For example; not being able to hear their name being called, hearing the cross walk when crossing the road, hearing the fire alarm etc.



Instruct the children to sit in a large circle on the floor. Place a chair in the center of the circle. Choose a student to sit in the chair. That person is "it". Tie a blindfold (the scarf) to cover the student's eyes. Make sure you ask the child's permission! Some students will not feel comfortable using the blindfold. Then point to a student in the circle. That student, "the speaker", then says hello to the child in the chair. The speaker can use a disguised voice or a normal voice. The student in the chair has to guess who is speaking. Allow only 2 or 3 guesses. Give everyone a chance to be "it".

### Discussion topic:

Talk to the students about how our ears not only help us hear, but they aid in balance and direction as well. Was it more difficult for the students to determine where the sounds were coming from when they were only listening out of one ear? What implications could this have for a deaf person? Could a deaf person safely cross the road? Could a partially deaf person determine where sound was coming form in a large, noisy crowd?

### Lesson Plan 4 - Whisper Train


Get the class to sit in a single file line facing forward. Start with the student at one end of the line and whisper a sentence to them. Usually a sentence with alliterations can be fun such as 'She sells sea shells by the sea shore.' The student must then pass on the sentence (as they interpret it) by whispering it to the next child, and so on until the message reaches the student at the other end of the line. The last student must say the sentence as they have interpreted it as the last person in the group.

Discussion Topic – Talk about how messages that are passed through many different ears can be misheard or misunderstood and why it is important to listen carefully to what others are saying.

- 5) Aim a ball at a row of cans
- 6) Build a tower of matchsticks
- 7) Pick up peas with a drinking straw.
- 8) Add anything else that you can think of.
